Course Description

This course will cover major turning points in modern Iran from the 1906 Constitutional Revolution to the 1979 Islamic Revolution and the postrevolutionary years, including the 2009 Green Movement. We will pay attention to the distinctive features of Shi'i Islam, to the rise of nationalism, to the quest for modernization, to democracy and authoritarianism, and to imperialism and the politics of oil. The course will end with a discussion of the Shi'i reformist movement that has arisen within the Islamic Republic, and which attempts to reconcile social and economic modernity with newer and more tolerant interpretations of Islam.
