RS 258. SEMINAR IN RELIGION IN AMERICA THE NINETEENTH AMERICAN CENTURY (1820-1914)

Course Description

The nineteenth American century extends from the early national period through the antebellum and postbellum years to the time of World War I. It was a time and a space in which, arguably, the religious and spiritual universe that Americans now inhabit was set in place. Perhaps to a slower beat than at present, but still dramatic and real, a technological revolution swept through the land. Previously, stage coaches could go at the maximum speed of seven miles an hour; now trains could reach sixty and settled down to average thirty-five. Steamboats changed over-the-water travel forever. Sustainable small-farm agriculture and cottage industries gave way increasingly to global markets and factories producing manufactured goods on large-scale fronts. Meanwhile, scientific challenges brought new scrutiny of the Bible, and higher criticism of the scripture began to erode faithfully held views of the origins of life and its spread. Frontier fever, increasing immigration from abroad, and emigration from small villages and towns to growing cities chipped away at communal identities and ways of living. More and more, people were nudged into individualizing patterns in which they needed to cope on their own and find the spiritual resources to do so. Seeker culture grew apace, and new religious movements abounded. An era of religious experiment and change seemed everywhere burgeoning.

In religious terms, more specifically, these developments were expressed in a rising evangelical culture, often with aspirations toward social reform, and in a democratic outburst of new religious movements such as Mormonism, Shakerism, Christian Science, and the like. (European) Continental romanticism found its American partner in the New England Transcendentalism that looked toward European spiritual currents as well as Asian ones. After the Civil War, metaphysical movements, like Theosophy and New Thought, especially found a welcome haven in this new America, even as, before and after the war, mainline Protestants solidified their presence in a "benevolent empire" with political power and savvy. By the end of the era, in a contrasting movement, fundamentalism was flourishing.

Arguably, all of these were the building blocks (or moving currents) that shaped the spiritual and religious America of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Given that estimate, an immersion in the religious phenomena that transformed the nineteenth American century is basic for any meaningful comprehension of what followed. We will move through this nineteenth-century spiritual terrain with the help of both primary and secondary sources, letting the compelling nature of these documents guide us and, as we

go, noticing the correlations (and dissonances) between past and present. If there is theory to be made out of all this, it must come, first, through thorough familiarity with the documents.
